#### **Legal Writing 3 and Legal Writing 4**

Day Division students are required to take Legal Writing 3 and Legal Writing 4 during their second year. Legal Writing 3 provides an introduction to researching and writing about non-litigation transactional issues and documents, with additional emphasis on oral communication with colleagues and clients. All sections of Legal Writing 3 are offered as General Practice sections. Legal Writing 4 focuses on advanced research and writing skills in a variety of doctrinal areas and on creating legal instruments common to these areas. All second-year Day Division students were required to take Legal Writing 3 in the Fall semester, except for those who took a Legal Writing 4 Equivalency Class. Students who took an Equivalency Class in the Fall, and deferred Legal Writing 3, must register for Legal Writing 3 this semester. All other second-year Day Division students must register for Legal Writing 4 this semester.

### ADR IN THE WORKPLACE (2 credits)

Prof. Totonchi

Course number: 427-01

Monday, January 10 - Friday, January 14

Pass/fail not available. This intensive class explores the doctrine and process of labor arbitration, employment mediation and employment arbitration. Students will participate in selecting neutral arbitrators, prepping for and conducting labor arbitrations, an employment mediation and an employment arbitration. There will be comments, critiques and suggestions at every step along the way. The condensed schedule should help you focus on mediation and arbitration as you would in real life. Class will meet for approximately 21 hours during the week (the hours will vary depending on the day, and there will be no in-person class session on Wednesday in order for the students to prepare for the rest of the week), with approximately 6 hours of additional instruction through distance learning techniques. If you enroll in the course and later decide not to take it, you must drop it no later than Friday, December 31, or you will be charged full tuition for the course unless another student takes your place. Priority for this class will be given to students seeking the Labor and Employment Law Certificate or the Workplace Litigation and Alternative Dispute Resolution Certificate.

#### INTENSIVE TRIAL ADVOCACY 1 (3 credits)

## PUBLIC INTEREST HOUSING LAW WORKSHOP (3 credits)

Monday, January 10 - Saturday, January 15 (online)

The class will meet online via Zoom from 9:00 am to -3:00 pm each day. The class will address the property tax foreclosure crisis in Detroit. One in four Detroit properties have been subject to property tax foreclosure. More troubling, the City assessed the majority of Detroit homes at rates that violated the Michigan Constitution, placing the unprecedented number of property tax foreclosures in disrepute. Working collaboratively with the Coalition for Property Tax Justice and its partner organizations, students will spend the week working to end the property tax foreclosure crisis in Detroit and learning about housing injustice in America. ### STRATEGIC PROBLEM-SOLVING AND THE LAW (2 or 3 credits)

Monday, January 10 - Friday, January 14

Pass/fail only. This course will immerse students in complex, contemporary legal problems that demand creative, sophisticated analysis and prompt action. Working entirely in groups, students will delve into different subject areas, including employment relationships, data privacy, consumer rights and relational contracts. Each of the four problems that we work on will include intensive, practical research training; in particular, the course will be covering free, practice-related research, government document research, international law and business research. The course aims to simulate decision-making challenges that you often don't face in law school, but frequently face in the real world. Students will produce several kinds of written work product, including client letters, informal government memos, corporate policy papers, and negotiation outlines. Students will also give oral group presentations to a "client," a "politician" and the "executive board of a for-profit company." You will be expected to be available for group work from 8:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. each day except Friday (when we will end by 4:00 p.m.). You will also have (often a lot of) work to do in the evenings after 6:00 p.m.

There will be preliminary reading and research, emailed to you in December, but which must be done before class starts. You may take the course for 2 or 3 credits; students taking it for 3 credits will be assigned some supplemental reading and be required to complete a short paper, which will be due Friday, March 18th.

If you enroll in the course and later decide not to take it, you must drop it no later than <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>December 28th</u>, at 3:00 pm or you will be charged full tuition for the course unless another student takes your seat. Priority for this class will be given to third-year students and students seeking the Praxis Certificate. First-year students may not take this class.
